## Items for Goodie Bags





# Diane Okeson

Diane Okeson has taught classes, shown her quilts through trunk shows, judged quilt shows and served on various boards and organizations. She and her husband Dave have two married children, and three grandchildren. She is presently serving as the President of the Kansas Quilters Organization. She has held several positions on her local quilt guild including President. Diane and her family are very active in their church where she has been Vacation Bible School Director, taught Sunday School Classes, served as Bible study leader and chair for her circle, and held various offices on the District Board for LWML.

Diane has taught and worked in the field of nursing for over 35 years. She served on the State Board of Nursing and the National council of Nursing and as an item writer for the National Licensure Exam. She has articles and research published as well as chapters in nursing texts. She was honored to be selected as the key-note speaker for several nursing conferences. Students

always commented on her ability to explain difficult skills in understandable and simplistic terms and demonstration. She brings that same enthusiastic love of teaching to her quilt making and quilt teaching. She began “sampling” quilting about 20 years ago but has become an accomplished quilter in the last few years. She enjoys reading and studying about tips, techniques, patterns and the history of quilt making, as well as making quilts, usually for family and friends or for special occasions. She likes to try new techniques, color variations, and adapt patterns or designs with the addition of her own personal touches. She loves to travel and tries to stop at new quilting stores along the way. She finds it fascinating how each shop has its own personality. She enjoys visiting with fellow quilters and learning about people and their quilting stories. The memories and stories attached to quilts are what make them each such a treasure.

Her most popular trunk shows are: one entitled “Piecing Memo-

ries” where she shows some quilts over 70 years old and tells the family stories behind them. She also shows her quilts and shares her story of her quilting history. Another popular trunk show is entitled “Christmas Traditions and Memories”. During this show the audience views her many Christmas Quilts and other family Christmas articles and hears the family story of their Christmas traditions. Who doesn’t want to go to Hawaii? She has a popular trunk show that includes her many examples of Hawaiian applique as well as other quilts utilizing different types and techniques of applique. She also does a trunk show of the “Quick and Magnificent” showing quick quilts and how to do them, and utilize color to make them interesting.

Her quilts have earned her blue and purple ribbons, special applique awards and Best of Show. She has taught multiple classes on a variety of topics such as piecing, appliqué, Hawaiian Applique, stained glass quilts, mariners compass, and a variety of quick projects. She has several original designs and teaches the process for making your own pattern. During her workshops and classes, she enjoys sharing tips that you don’t always find in print anywhere. Quilting and being active in her organizations is a great way to meet and make new friends! Happy Quilting.


