Welcome to Emporia from the Chamber of Commerce!





Karla Alexander

Circles and Ovals Play—

Karla Alexander lives in Salem Oregon, with her husband, Don, and family dog, Lucy.

She is the author of eight quilt books as well as her own line of patterns publishing under the name, Saginaw Street Quilts (www.SaginawStreetQuilts.com). Karla is also owner and partner in Cascade Quilt Retreats, which coordinates Spring, Fall and Winter quilt getaways at various locations in the Willamette Valley and Oregon Coast. Karla is on the design team for Creative Grid Rulers having designed eight specialty rulers to use along with her quilting methods. She was a featured guest on Simply Quilts and on The Quilt Show with Alex and Ricky. She is a featured Artist for Island Batiks.



Karla's philosophy regarding quilting is to enjoy the process, learn from your experience and take what you learn from one project on to the next.

Class description—

Level of Experience: Beginner to Advanced

Sewing Circles and/or curves has never been so much fun! NO worries if you've never sewn curves before OR if you prefer straight seams... you will leave class a MASTER of CURVES! Come ready to experiment and learn exciting new piecing techniques from basic arcs to full "Set In" Circles as well as improvisational techniques. I guarantee, you will never be afraid of curves once you finish this class! You will be encouraged to follow your instincts while exploring additional options along the way. Of course you are always welcome to follow any of the pre-planned patterns/designs (see list below) step by step if you prefer. Quarter arc blocks are used to make many of the base blocks – then the fun begins by building in the extras along with different layouts for all the different designs.

Fabric Tips

In this class, you will be learning how to successfully sew curves, circles and ovals. IF you choose to simply learn all the techniques, contrasting fat quarters, layer cakes and/or charm packs work well. I suggest a minimum of 8 fat quarters understanding that more choices equal more fun and flexibility. We will also review fabric colors and different prints along the way. Again, if you'd like to practice first, bring along fabric to play with and then move on to the a final project.

Supplies—

- Sewing Machine in good working order
- Basic Rotary cutting and Sewing supplies
- 9 1/2 x 9 1/2" square ruler or larger
- * Suggested Ruler (Choose one or both) Circle Savvy Ruler or Ovals All Ways Ruler

If you prefer not to use a ruler, please bring 1 yard of freezer paper for templates.

Giant Clam Shells

LEVEL OF EXPERIENCE: Beginner to Intermediate

Finished Size: 60" x 81"

This is a fun design AND is an easy sew! You can pre-choose the clams colors as you go, or audition them along the way. Follow the pattern exactly or learn how to mix it up once in class.

FABRIC TIP

Choose bright contrasting prints.

SUPPLIES:

Pattern: Giant Clams Shells By Karla Alexander

Sewing machine in good working order

Basic rotary cutting and sewing supplies

9 1/2" x 9 1/2" or larger square ruler

OPTIONAL: 2 yds white flannel for design wall

OPTIONAL: Ruler "Circle Savvy Ruler" by Creative Grids – CGRSBV1

If you don't have access to the ruler, please bring a yard of freezer paper for templates.

FABRIC:

18 contrasting Fat Quarters; for this quilt, I used 6 dark, 5 green/blue, 4 gray and 7 orange/pink/gold

IF YOU ARE SATISFIED WITH YOUR CHOICES, PLEASE PRE-CUT FABRIC FOR BLOCKS

PRIOR TO CLASS

Fold FQ into quarters and cut each folded piece into four rectangles, 8 1/2" x 10". Keep rectangles in the exact stack in which they were cut with 2 rectangles right side up and 2 rectangles right side down.



Blue Moon

Finished Size: 60" x 80"

Finished Block Size: 10" x 10"

This is a fun design as you go quilt! You can audition the moon colors and sizes along the way, providing the opportunity to make changes well into the project. Follow the pattern exactly or make it your own! Easy tips and techniques will inspire you along the way to create your own awesome quilt!

LEVEL OF EXPERIENCE: Beginner to Intermediate

FABRIC TIP

Choose bright contrasting prints without a lot of pattern so that they appear as solid fabrics from a distance.

SUPPLIES:

Suggested Book: Color Shuffle! By Karla Alexander

Sewing machine in good working order

Basic rotary cutting and sewing supplies

Several pieces of blank paper

12 1/2" x 12-1/2" acrylic square ruler

10 squares of freezer paper 11" x 11" each (or larger)

OPTIONAL: 2 yds white flannel for design wall

OPTIONAL: Ruler "Circle Savvy Ruler" by Creative Grids – CGRSV1

FABRIC:

3/8 yard EACH of 8 different medium blue batiks for blocks

3/8 yard EACH of 8 different dark blue batiks for pieced border

1/3 yard EACH of 7 different light to medium lime green batiks for moons

1/3 yard of fabric for binding


5 1/8 yards of fabric for backing

PLEASE PRE-CUT FABRIC FOR BLOCKS ACCORDING TO BOOK PRIOR TO CLASS

CUTTING FOR BLOCKS:

MEDIUM Blue - cut a total of 24 squares, 10 7/8" x 10 7/8"

DARK Blue - cut a total of 24 squares, 11" x 11" each

Vintage Work—

I pieced my first blocks more than 30 years ago when fabric choices were limited and before rotary cutters. I am infatuated, obsessed, or whatever you want to call it, with vintage tablecloths, dish towels, and embroidery from the 1930s-1950s and use them in many of my quilt designs. Lawrence, Kansas, is now my home and I enjoy going to estate sales, flea markets, and antique stores to find unique linens.

I transitioned from hand quilting to free motion quilting on a longarm machine several years ago and now also quilt for others who love to make quilts. Teaching fellow vintage lovers how to design quilts using vintage tablecloths is a wonderful way to spend my day. My Facebook group, 'Quilting Kitchen Vintage', has members from around the world who also love vintage kitchen linens. You can also visit 'Patti Pearce Quilting' on Facebook.

Class description—

During our workshop we'll look at some quilts and wall hangings I created from vintage tablecloths and kitchen towels for inspiration on designing your own. I'll also offer patterns and vintage kitchen linens for sale.



Supplies—

Design workshop supply list

- Vintage tablecloth or kitchen towel (I will also have some for sale)
- Coordinating fabric
- Graph paper (preferably 8x8) – I'll also bring some
- Pencil and eraser
- Stabilizer if your vintage item is a loose weave
- Fabric cutting supplies (rotary cutter, mat, rulers)
- Irons and ironing boards
- Sewing machine
- General sewing supplies (scissors, thread, seam ripper, pins, etc.)

Caring for your OLFA Rotary Mat: To clean your OLFA mat, use a generous amount of room temperature water and a few drops of mild detergent. Use a soft, mild bristle brush to create a lather and gently clean your mat. Rinse with room temperature water and wipe dry with a cotton towel. Please note that warm or hot water and direct sun light may damage the mat. This information is provided by OLFA, the manufacturer of OLFA cutting mats.

Minutes of the General Meeting

September 30, 2017

The General Meeting of the membership of Kansas Quilters Organization was called to order in the First United Methodist Church of Lyons, Kansas, at 9:00 a.m., on September 30, 2017, by the President Diane Okeson.

The President recognized new members from Pratt and Elinwood.

Prayers were requested for Board members Mary Johnson and Charlene Calhoun who have had surgery. Diane also announced that she has finished her cancer treatments and is now on maintenance medication. Pam Calhoun announced that member LaRue Nuest is in a nursing facility in a two-room apartment. Her address is Brookdale Nursing Home, 2416 Brentwood St., Room 145, Hutchison, KS 67502. Her birthday is October 21st. Sheila Fernkopf was unable to attend due to family commitments.

Kathy Delaney, Beth Coldwater and Bernice Bounds were recognized by the President and membership for their efforts in arranging for this successful meeting. Kathy Delaney expressed her thanks to Beth, Bernice and the local Piecemakers Guild, she said without their help this meeting could not have happened.

Tickets for opportunity quilts were available and members were encouraged to take advantage of the opportunity on breaks to get tickets.

Diane noted that the KQO journals were the members' gifts for this meeting. They were distributed at lunch. Topeka members provided thread catchers which were appreci-

ated by members and were found in the goody bags.

Charter members were recognized and the remaining prior board members were also recognized.

The president announced that three board members were leaving the board after serving for six years. Christina Bloom, Kathy Triplett and Charlene Calhoun were recognized. The remaining current board members were recognized.

Minutes of the General Meeting held in Manhattan on July 16, 2017, were printed in the newsletter. On motion made by Tony Munoz and seconded by Kathy Delaney the minutes were approved as printed.

Rose Cantrell, the treasurer reported current balances of \$17,776 in checking and \$6,660 in the CD as of this date. Rose noted that not all bills for this meeting had been paid.

The meeting proceeded to the election of additional board members. Diane noted that the bios of Rachel Moreland and Diane McCoon were printed in the newsletter. Kathy Delaney moved and Jillann Mahoney-Dawdy seconded the motion to elect both to the board, the motion carried. Diane noted that she has appointed Betty Simmons to complete the remaining two years of the term of Tony Munoz.

Diane announced that the board members will meet before lunch to elect officers for 2018.

Pam Calhoun and her class members showed their progress on the Poppies quilts which she taught on Friday. The class also made hexagon blocks which were won by Diane Okeson.

Marg Evers' Seminole patchwork class showed the fruits of their la-

bors and briefly discussed Seminole patchwork.

Stretch break and breathing exercise.

Diane announced that the early bird drawing winner was Marjorie Buck. She is entitled to half-price registration for the next meeting. That needs to be noted on her registration form.





Using Fabric D square and the Fabric B and C larger triangles make 4 units



Using the smaller triangles of Fabric B & C sew to the corner. Make 2 of each unit pictured above.



Sew the Fabric A triangle to each unit. This square should measure 6 1/2".
Sew the squares together per large diagram.

12 " block is **BOLD**, 6" block is ()

- A - Cut 2@ 6 7/8" (3 7/8") square cut once on diagonal
- B - Cut 1 @ 5 1/4" (3 1/4") square cut twice on diagonal
1 @ 2 7/8" (1 7/8") square cut once on diagonal
- C - Cut 1 @ 5 1/4" (3 1/4") square cut twice on diagonal
1 @ 2 7/8" (1 7/8") square cut once on diagonal
- D - Cut 4 @ 3 5/16" (1 15/16") squares
